Community Plan 23/24

Our engagement includes conversations with individuals, voluntary, community and faith sector groups and organisations and businesses. The survey was primarily completed online. However, paper versions were also circulated in post offices, local shops and libraries.

The survey was distributed through a range of channels to increase accessibility:

- QR coded posters in locations around the wards
- direct contact with established lists of individuals and community organisations and businesses
- face-to-face consulting residents in the community
- the findings of engagement sessions at public meetings also feed in.

We will continue to try and reach wider engagement, particularly from those who are underrepresented. We will continually review the community plan priorities and actions to ensure these reflect what people tell us are important to them and would benefit them as resident of the South West Area.

The draft refreshed Community Plan proposal was developed with the understanding of some of the challenges faced in establishing a new way of working. The learning from the past year has informed how we set goals for this financial year, so they are realistic and deliverable within timescales and resource requirements and financial parameters, up to the end of the financial year 23/24.

We realise that further actions/projects will likely be included from engagement sessions held, such as the Youth Voice and this will be brought to the November '23 public meeting for reporting.
