ADVICE TO MEMBERS ON DECLARING INTERESTS AT MEETINGS

A new Standards regime was introduced on 1st July, 2012 by the Localism Act 2011. The new regime made changes to the way that your interests needed to be registered and declared. Prejudicial and personal interests no longer exist and they have been replaced by Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPIs).

The Act also required that provision is made for interests which are not Disclosable Pecuniary Interests and required the Council to introduce a new local Code of Conduct for Members. Provision has been made in the new Code for dealing with "personal" interests.

Guidance on declarations of interest, incorporating regulations published by the Government in relation to Disclosable Pecuniary Interests, has been circulated to you previously, and has been published on the Council's website as a downloadable document at -<u>http://councillors.sheffield.gov.uk/councillors/register-of-councillors-interests</u>

If at all possible, you should try to identify any potential interest you may have before the meeting so that you and the person you ask for advice can fully consider all the circumstances before reaching a conclusion on what action you should take.

1. Summary

1.1 South Community Assembly has delivered its agreed programme of local highway schemes in 2011/12, including consultation and development work on further schemes for future delivery. The Assembly now needs to set out its priorities for spending in 2012/13 as described in the programme now proposed

2. What does this mean for people within the South Community Assembly Area?

2.1 The local highway schemes now proposed will assist local people in using pedestrian routes in their area, crossing roads or in the control of vehicles (moving or stationary) in and around their area, adding to improved community safety.

3. Outcomes and Sustainability

3.1 The funding and construction of the local highways schemes contributes to meeting the 'Increase mobility and provide safer routes for pedestrians' priority in the South Community Assembly Plan. It also contributes to the Council's Corporate Plan "Standing Up for Sheffield", particularly the "Great Place to Live" and "Safe and Secure Communities" outcomes.

4. Full Proposal

- 4.1 The South Community Assembly is sponsor for the development and delivery of a programme of local highway schemes. The 2011/12 programme was delivered in full (apart from works on Psalter Lane which are now progressing on site).
- 4.2 For 2012/13 the Council has reviewed its priorities and allocated a further £40,000 to each Community Assembly –essentially for continued delivery of "small schemes" (typically costing up to £3,000 £4,000).
- 4.3 Of the £40,000, Members have already agreed in principle to commit some of this for core activities, namely:
 - Maintenance of SIDS signs £5,200
 - A match funding contribution to SY Police road safety work around primary schools £3,500
 - A small overspend from last year £460
- 4.4 The remaining funds are proposed to be allocated for small schemes equally to the four wards. This leaves £7,760 per ward.
- 4.5 Members will be aware that as part of the Council's planned way of working within the Highways PFI contract, all new changes and improvements to the highway now require a 'commuted sum' to cover the altered maintenance requirement over a 25 year period as a result of those modifications. The changed requirements can be either positive or negative. For 2012/13 onwards, Community Assemblies are required to

budget for these commuted sums as part of their programme of small schemes.

- 4.6 Different types of small scheme can vary greatly in the scale of commuted sum associated with these. Appendix A lists typical 2012/13 prices and associated commuted sums for Members' guidance when selecting priorities for this year's programme.
- 4.7 Members have previously been consulted on initial lists of requests for the four wards to identify whether there were high priority schemes that could be approved at an early date. Appendix B shows these four lists, with requests previously suggested for early implementation highlighted in bold.
- 4.8 The lists also show a selection of known requests considered by officers to be some of the more easily deliverable. There are still other requests on the Community Assembly's "waiting list" but even this short selection exceeds the funds available.
- 4.9 Those requests involving single or double yellow lines can sometimes lead to divided opinions within the local community resulting in objections to the proposals. This has been the case at Bunting Nook, which was originally intended to be implemented last year but only recently obtained clearance to proceed, meaning that funding is now required from this year's programme.
- 4.10 Members therefore need to indicate their preferences for how this year's programme might be "topped up" from the lists of outstanding requests. All the schemes shown have merit, but officers have indicated those with asterisks that might be most easily delivered within the remaining resources. Members are asked to consider whether they support these suggested schemes.

5. Financial Implications

5.1 The implementation of these schemes would be supported by an agreed allocation within this year's Local Transport Plan (LTP) programme for the South Community Assembly.

6. Legal Implications

- 6.1 The Council, as the highways authority for Sheffield, has powers under Part V of the Highways Act 1980 to implement the improvements requested in this report. This funding is allocated from the Council's Local Transport Plan budget provided by central government and as such all projects using this funding will need to comply with the aims and objectives of the Local Transport Plan.
- 6.2 The Director of Neighbourhood Renewal and Partnerships in consultation with the Head of Transport & Highways and Director of Legal Services has confirmed this is an approved use of LTP funds, the Head of Transport & Highways has authority to undertake the wider feasibility work now described, as part of the Council's overall transport capital programme.

7. Equality of Opportunity Implications

7.1 There are no specifically direct equality implications, but all of the options have some impact on the overall quality of life for residents, and for pedestrians and other users who might have mobility problems. The options are intended to assist all members of the local community regardless of gender or ethnic origin.

8. Human Resource Implications

8.1 Any measures agreed by the South Community Assembly Highways Budget would be delivered by the City Council through the newTransport, Traffic and Parking Services Division, working with the PFI Client team and contractor as part of the Council's overall transport capital programme

9. Environmental and Sustainability Implications

9.1 The options now discussed could be regarded as having a neutral overall contribution to the City Council's carbon reduction strategy.

10. Mitigation of risk

10.1 The risks in developing the schemes now identified relate to the time required to undertake broader reviews, and to the scale of increased costs for those wider solutions.

11. Public Consultation, Alternative Options

11.1 The options available at present are of necessity very limited until further decisions of funding have been made

12. Reasons for Recommendations

12.1 South Community Assembly has funding in 2012/13 for a further programme of local highway schemes. Members are now asked to confirm their priorities for inclusion in this programme.

13. Recommendations

- 13.1 That Members note the 2012/13 allocation of £40,000 for new small highway schemes, and approve the programme now proposed.
- 13.2 That Members delegate to the South Assembly Manager in conjunction with the Community Assembly Chair decision on the schemes to be funded by any underspend of the highways funding allocation.

1.0 SUMMARY

1.1 Money has been received from developers for open space Section 106 Agreements in the South Community Assembly area. Members' agreement is now sought to allocate the funds to proposed sites where funding has been received.

4.0 FULL PROPOSAL

4.1.1 Allocation of agreements to project sites

4.3 **Financial Implications**

Monies have been received for the agreements discussed in this report. Once project sites have been agreed, it will be necessary for approval for capital spend to be gained under the council's capital approval procedure.

4.4 Legal Implications

Section 106 Agreements are legally binding agreements between developers and the City Council made using powers under the Town and Country Planning Act. It important that all aspects of agreements are adhered to since failure to do so may result in challenge by the developers and potential claw back of funds. Developers frequently contact the Planning Service to check if their funds have been spent and what they have been used for.

4.5 Equality of Opportunity Implications

Higher quality open spaces will result from using section 106 funds. This will bring a general benefit to most members of the community. Wherever possible, open space design attempts to improve safety and to improve accessibility for physically disabled people.

4.6 Human Resource Implications

Staff salaries in the Environmental Planning Design Team are partly funded by the fee element of Section 106 design work. Allocating funds to external organisations reduces the viability of the team.

4.7 Environmental and Sustainability Implications

Where open space projects are designed in house, care is always taken to use sustainably sourced materials and to provide solutions with low maintenance requirements. The two external organisations that may benefit from these funds are also known to adopt this approach.

4.8 Mitigation of risk

For in projects designed in house, a business plan and risk register is always prepared, the work is subject to the requirements of the corporate project management process, corporate procurement process and health and safety regulations. Where external organisations receive funds, the Environmental Planning Team manager works with them to ensure that the funds are used correctly and that the work is carried out in accordance with requirements.

5.0 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 There are various open space sites in the vicinity of some of the S106 agreements, the sites suggested are those which are thought to be priority sites within the South Community Assembly area.

6.0 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

6.1 Section 106 agreement funds need to be allocated to projects as soon as possible so that design and procurement work can commence. Although funds from the agreements which are the subject of this report have no specified clawback date, developers may make a case for repayment if they can demonstrate that there are no plans to spend the money.

Summary:

The South Community Assembly Discretionary Budget 2012/13 was agreed at the Assembly Meeting on March 29th 2012. Three of the projects funded were to be reviewed over the first quarter before the full 12 months funding was confirmed. This report provides a summary of the 2012/13 budget and recommendations in relation to those three projects.

Reasons for Recommendations:

The 2012/13 South Community Assembly Discretionary Budget will ensure activity takes place to address some of the priorities as identified in the South Community Assembly Plan. The continuation of the three projects referred to in the report will contribute to;

- Improve Parks and Open Spaces
- Improve the Streetscene
- Increase activities for Children and Young People
- Improve Local and District Shopping areas
- Reduce Crime and Anti-social behaviour
- Promote initiatives and projects that improve community cohesion in targeted areas
- Improve the health and wellbeing of older people
- Tackle Health Inequalities in targeted neighbourhoods

- Provide Increased Opportunity for people to access learning, skills and employment
- Contribute to the development of the Voluntary, Community and Faith Sector

Recommendations:

That the South Community Assembly:

1. Summary

The South Community Assembly Discretionary Budget 2012/13 was agreed at the Assembly Meeting on March 29th 2012. Three of the projects funded were to be reviewed over the first quarter before the full 12 months funding was confirmed. This report provides a summary of the 2012/13 budget and recommendations in relation to those three projects.

2. What does this mean for people within the Central Community Assembly Area?

The allocation of the remaining 2012/13 South Community Assembly Discretionary Budget will ensure activity takes place to address some of the priorities as identified in the South Community Assembly Plan, namely to;

- Improve Parks and Open Spaces
- Improve the Streetscene
- Increase activities for Children and Young People
- Improve Local and District Shopping areas
- Reduce Crime and Anti-social behaviour
- Promote initiatives and projects that improve community cohesion in targeted areas
- Improve the health and wellbeing of older people
- Tackle Health Inequalities in targeted neighbourhoods
- Provide Increased Opportunity for people to access learning, skills and employment
- Contribute to the development of the Voluntary, Community and Faith Sector

3. Outcomes and Sustainability

The funding identified in this report will contribute to the delivery of the priorities in the South Community Assembly Plan, thus benefiting residents in the South Community Assembly Area.

The projects and activity within this report contribute to all five of the key ambitions as indicated in the Sheffield City Strategy 2010-2020 (Sheffield 2020 – Where People Shape the Future) –

- **Distinctive**; using the immense sense of pride local people have in the city and South of Sheffield to bring local projects forward for funding.
- **Successful**; working with partners at a local level with joint employment and community projects and strategically through our formal partnerships.
- **Inclusive**; support projects that enable all sections of our community to benefit and join in new activities.
- **Vibrant**; support the community and voluntary sector in working to achieve the priorities for the area.

Since the allocations were agreed the following activity has taken place -

- a) <u>Barbers Field</u> waiting for full cost for construction of steps before raising order and issuing Service Level Agreement
- b) <u>Lengthspeople</u> order raised for 4 months provision. Feedback from Streetforce is that there has been little negative impact following the reduction in service. Proposed that Community Assembly Manager meets with Amey with a view to continuing the service after July 2012, with a budget limit of £18,700.
- c) <u>Neighbourhood Environmental Action Team (NEAT)</u> order raised for 3 months provision. Discussions have been ongoing between Parks & Public Realm, Lifelong Learning, Skills and Communities and the South Community Assembly Team to set up process for throughput of young people considered NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training). Barriers to this now seem to have been overcome and progress was reported back at the last Partner Panel meeting. Proposed that this project receives the further 9 months' funding.
- <u>Additional activities for Children and Young People</u> Expressions of Interest submitted by potential providers assessed on 20th June and all the funding was allocated. List of successful organisations will be available at the Assembly meeting.

- e) <u>Floral Features</u> order raised and floral features in the process of being installed.
- f) <u>Community Pride budget</u> managed by the South Community Assembly Team. Small amount used to date for promoting Weeks of Action, etc.
- g) <u>Additional activities / services for Older People</u> Councillors keen that this is targeted at social exclusion. Expressions of Interest to be sought in July 2012.
- h) <u>Small Grants pot for Graves Park and Nether Edge wards</u> Assessment panel met on 15th June and all the funding for both wards was allocated. List of successful organisations will be available at the Assembly meeting.
- i) Community Engagement and supporting Service Delivery
 - Project proposal received from Gleadless Valley Community Forum and funding agreement now in place.
 - Regular discussions have been taking place between LBJ Forum Trustees and the South Community Assembly Manager. Trustees have developed a new management structure, headed up by a 'Development Officer' that will focus more on volunteer recruitment as well as co-ordinate the delivery of community based services for Children & Young People, Older People, Adult Learning. They will also be responsible for management of the G&B Youth and Community Centre. Stronger links have also been established between the Forum and the LBJ Older People's Services Project which will provide real opportunities for the Forum to be commissioned to provide services and become more sustainable. Proposed that this project receives the further 9 months' funding.

5. Financial Implications

The 2012/13 Discretionary Budget for the South Community Assembly is $\pounds 216,805$. This report proposes how the Assembly should allocate $\pounds 66,200$ of this budget to tackle a range of priorities from within the South Community Plan. This will be monitored in accordance with Sheffield City Council financial procedures.

It is proposed that delegations be given to the relevant officers by the Assembly to ensure that the grants can be distributed and managed in the manner that is proposed.

6. Legal Implications

In implementing these proposals reliance can be placed on the new 'general power of competence' (the 'GPC') conferred on the Council by Section 1(1) of the Localism Act 2011.

(Section 1(1) came into force on 18th February 2012 and provides that, "A *local authority has power to do anything that individuals generally may do.*"

This is clearly a very broad power, but it must be noted that it is subject to existing or future statutory limitations.)

The procurement of any goods, works or services must be undertaken in accordance with all relevant provisions of Sheffield City Council's Constitution including the Council's Contracts Standing Orders and all applicable procurement rules.

7. Equality of Opportunity Implications

The South Community Assembly Discretionary budget has been allocated to help address a range of needs in the area, as dictated by the Central Community Assembly Plan (which is supported by an Equality Impact Assessment).

8. Human Resource Implications

Funding provided for Lengthspeople and NEAT team are likely to impact on the staffing resources within Street Force and the Parks and Public Realm Service.

9. Environmental and Sustainability Implications

Funding provided for Lengthspeople and NEAT team will have a positive impact on the local environment

10. Mitigation of Risk

The risks relating to this proposal have been considered by the South Community Assembly Team. These risks will be regularly reviewed and monitored.

Projects funded may not lead to noticeable improvement in the priority issue. The Assembly Team (and the Accountable Bodies Team which administers funding) will monitor the impact of activity throughout the coming year, to assess whether projects have been effective.

The Accountable Bodies Team will administer the distribution of funding and ensure agreed targets and outcomes are being met. They will do this through the receipt of monitoring forms from providers and by visiting projects / activity on the ground.

The Assembly Manager will ensure payments are made as per the project proposal form and are released on time as per Council rules. The projects need to be aware that all funding must be spent by 31st March 2013 and no carry forward or extension is likely.

11. Alternative Options

Councillors could choose not to provide further funding to the Lengthsperson service, the Neighbourhood Environmental Action Team or for Community Engagement in Lowedges, Batemoor and Jordanthorpe. Funding would then be reallocated at the Community Assembly meeting on 4th October, along with the remaining Contingency Budget.

12. Reasons for Recommendations

The 2012/13 South Community Assembly Discretionary Budget will ensure activity takes place to address some of the priorities as identified in the South Community Assembly Plan. The continuation of the three projects referred to in the report will contribute to;

- Improve Parks and Open Spaces
- Improve the Streetscene

- Reduce Crime and Anti-social behaviour
- Promote initiatives and projects that improve community cohesion in targeted areas

- Contribute to the development of the Voluntary, Community and Faith Sector

4. Full Proposal

The South Community Involvement Plan (Appendix A) sets out a clear programme of delivery for engaging with local residents over the next 12 months. The South Community Involvement Plan also provides a focal point of information that can be shared between key agencies about what activities/events are taking place to deliver consultation that affects neighbourhoods across the South Community Assembly area.

Therefore the South Community Involvement Plan will -

- Identify and explore local priorities to support the refresh of the South Community Plan
- Ensure local people have the opportunity to get involved in a variety of local issues as they emerge.
- Provide councillors with robust information to assist them in making decisions on service provision and budget allocation.
- Provide a tool for all partners to map out and co-ordinate community involvement activity across the area.
- Provide the framework for joint community involvement activity with community organisations

The South Community Involvement Plan will be regularly updated throughout the year as opportunities emerge.

It is recommended that the South Community Assembly adopts this Community Involvement Plan as a basis for involving local residents across the area in the work of the South Community Assembly and other local issues over the next 12 months.

5. Financial Implications

There are no specific financial implications arising from this proposal. The work associated with the Community Involvement Plan will be delivered by the Community Assembly Officer, supported by other South Community Assembly officers.

6. Legal Implications

Under Sheffield City Council's Constitution the terms of reference of each Community Assembly includes: "To agree a Community Involvement Plan for engaging with local residents and voluntary and community sector organisations in improving the Community Assembly area".

The process of community involvement falls within the statutory powers given to the Council by Section 88, Local Government Act 1985 (research), and Section 142, Local Government Act 1972 (provision of information about Council functions).

7. Equality of Opportunity Implications

An Equality Impact Assessment (EIA) has been completed in conjunction with the South Community Plan, and the individual priorities within it. Through this process it was highlighted that the plan needs to look at targeted activity.

The South Community Involvement Plan itself endeavours to provide equal opportunities for all residents within the area to influence the South Community Plan, the work of the South Community Assembly and the services delivered by partner agencies.

8. Human Resource Implications

The work associated with the Community Involvement Plan will be delivered by the Community Assembly Officer and supported by other South Community Assembly officers.

9. Environmental and Sustainability Implications

There is no direct impact on environment and sustainability, other than residents identifying these issues as a local priority and their subsequent inclusion in the South Community Plan.

10. Mitigation of Risk

The risks relating to this proposal have been considered by the South Community Assembly Team. These risks will be regularly reviewed and monitored.

Community Involvement in local decision making is at the heart of the Council's Corporate Plan, however this can often lead to increased community expectations and conflicting opinions. The South Community Assembly Team are experienced and skilled in Community Involvement and Development and will be able to mediate during conflicts and manage community expectations.

11. Alternative Options

Councillors could choose not to adopt the South Community Involvement Plan. Alternatively, they may choose to focus officer time on specific elements within the Plan, rather than what is being proposed.

<u>Community events</u> - The decision to attend the events outlined in the South Community Involvement Plan was made on the basis of having maximum impact, providing an even spread and the efficient use of staff time / resources. Councillors may choose to instruct officers to attend more or less of these types of events.

<u>Service Provider Roadshows</u> – in 2011/12 roadshows took place before Community Assembly meetings. It is now proposed that these are stand alone events targeted at specific communities. Councillors could choose to revert back to having these events before Assembly meetings, or not have them at all.

<u>Targeted Activity / Communities of Interest</u> – This year there will be focused involvement activity with Young People (with Sheffield Futures), BME communities and Older People. Alternative options could include focused work with other communities of interest rather than those stated above.

Other ongoing methods of involvement and communication – the South Community Involvement Plan indicates that the South Community Assembly team will continue to utilise Active8, community newsletters, the website / blog, local press, flyers and attendance at community meetings to involve local people in the work of the South Community Assembly. Alternatives could be to have some additional emphasis on one or more of the involvement methods illustrated.

12. Reasons for Recommendations

The involvement of communities is the main component in Sheffield City Council's ambition to change the way the Council delivers services in the city. Communities and residents will continue to have more opportunities to influence service delivery in their neighbourhood so that they meet local priorities and needs. This will contribute to making communities safe and sustainable.

13. Recommendations

INTRODUCTION

Sheffield Community Assemblies aim to achieve more practical and efficient ways to engage more local residents. Our aim is to become increasingly effective and inclusive, using different community involvement methods. Styles will vary throughout different communities in order to reflect on neighbourhood needs. This plan will compliment and help deliver the Sheffield City Council Community (SCC) Involvement Strategy and the South Community Assembly Community Plan. The following wards that fall within the South Community Assembly boundary -

- Graves Park Ward
- Gleadless Valley Ward
- Beauchief & Greenhill Ward
- Nether Edge Ward

Why do we want to engage?

The successful engagement of local people should result in services being more effectively targeted and delivered at a local level. Local people are the experts on how services affect them, their quality of life and their needs. It is important to ensure that services are being delivered in a way that meets local need, and that any project or issue to be addressed takes these needs into account. Sometimes services and solutions can be complex, so it is important that community involvement is maintained throughout a change process to ensure the end result is in line with community expectations and community needs.

Who we want to engage with?

It is important that the Community Assembly obtains the views of local people, and these views should represent the diversity of the population, as far as is reasonably practical. For monitoring purposes, people who attend Community Assembly Events, or give their views by other means, when appropriate will be asked to supply their demographic details for monitoring against the demographic profile of the community.

How are we going to engage?

Engagement activity will tend to fall into the categories below; in some cases an engagement activity may incorporate more than one of these.

- **Community events** providing opportunity for residents to inform and influence local priorities to be included in the South Community Plan.
- Service Provider roadshows market place where residents can meet local service providers and raise local issues of concern
- Targeted activity specific work with Communities of Interest or Communities of Place
- **Ongoing Communication and Consultation** ongoing activity to keep local residents informed via local newsletters, website, mailouts, posters, local press, blog and facebook.
- City-wide or Area-wide consultation usually by Sheffield City Council or Partner agencies and tends to be on strategic priorities

The current engagement structure

The Community Assembly, whenever possible, will engage with communities using the existing community events, community groups, etc. The benefits of this are:

• Makes best use of resources

- Easier to engage with people where events and activities are already established
- Supports the existing engagement infrastructure

For this purpose, a database of community events and community group meetings will be maintained.

What do we want from our partners?

We would like to work together with all our partners when work is delivered which involves engaging with local residents. Rather than duplicating work this is an opportunity to enhance our delivery within the South Community Assembly area. Therefore we envisage that whenever any engagement activity is planned we request that the Assembly Officer (Sarah Lucas) is contacted at the first stage of planning, who will record the activity in the Community Involvement Plan. This will mean there is one document which records what engagement activity is happening locally and will provide the opportunity to link up and pool resources.

How will we evaluate our work?

We will provide regular updates to the Partner Panel and Elected Members (Briefing meeting and Community Assembly meetings) every 6 months to review and evaluate consultation taken by the South Community Assembly Team. An evaluation on Community Involvement work in 2012/13 is available on request.

1. Summary

The South Community Assembly has been consulted about nominating a Councillor to become a member of the Sheffield Homes South West Area Board. Cllr Steve Jones has been provisionally proposed as the nominee for 2012/13. The views of the Cabinet Member for Homes and Neighbourhoods have been sought and his response will be reported to the meeting so it can be taken into account.

2. What does this mean for people within the South Community Assembly Area?

Part of the governance structure of Sheffield Homes includes Area Boards, the purpose of which is to:

"provide a focus on services and customers in a local area, to ensure that Sheffield Homes services are responsive to the varying needs of different communities in Sheffield".

3. Outcomes and Sustainability

This proposal fits in with the values and outcomes of the Corporate Plan 2011-14 'Standing up for Sheffield'.

- Safe and Secure Communities

4. Full Proposal

The Leader's scheme of delegation for the discharging executive functions authorises Community Assemblies to "nominate Council representation for the appropriate Sheffield Homes Area Board in consultation with the appropriate Cabinet member". The appropriate Cabinet member is currently the holder of the Homes and Neighbourhoods portfolio.

Sheffield Homes are a key partner in each of the Assembly Areas. They have named senior officer representation on each of the Partner Panels and have worked closely with the Assembly Teams on a number of projects and initiatives. The Area Boards meet on a bi-monthly basis and the agendas focus on service delivery by the Company at an area level. They provide a key link in the Company's governance structure between the Board of Directors, Tenants' and Residents' Associations (TARAs), Local Housing Partnership groups and tenants.

The composition of Area Boards is as follows: -

- 5 tenants.
- 4 independents.
- 2 Sheffield City Council appointees.
- A maximum of one leaseholder may take one of the tenant places on each Area Board.

The expectation is that the Assembly's nominees would provide the formal link between the work of the Assembly and Sheffield Homes, further strengthening the partnership relationships and reassuring tenants and residents that there is an additional opportunity for influencing the work priorities of the Assembly and also ensuring that opportunities for joint work are not missed.

The practice of Assemblies making nominations to the Sheffield Homes Area Boards, promotes closer working relationships between tenants and the members of the Assembly. This increases the influence of and helps to inform the decision making of the Assemblies.

The Boundaries between the South West Area Board and South Community Assembly do not match. As such, one Sheffield City Council representative will be appointed by the South Community Assembly and the other by the South West Community Assembly

The South Community Assembly has been consulted about nominating a Councillor to become a member of the Sheffield Homes South West Area Board. The views of the Cabinet Member for Homes and Neighbourhoods have been sought and his response will be reported to the meeting so it can be taken into account.

Although the function of nominating Council representatives to the Area Boards has been allocated to the Community Assemblies, under the Council's arrangements for discharging 'local choice functions', the actual appointment of the nominees is a non-executive function reserved to Full Council. The Assembly's nominations will therefore need to be referred to Council for endorsement.

5. Financial Implications

There are no specific financial implications arising from this proposal.

6. Legal Implications

There are no specific legal implications arising from this proposal, other than that the appointees will need to be mindful of their legal role and responsibilities when serving on the local Board.

If a nominee is no longer able to fulfil this role (temporarily or permanently) then the Assembly will have to provide a substitute as and when that situation arises.

11. Alternative Options

The South Community Assembly could consider an alternative nominee to the Councillor proposed.

12. Reasons for Recommendations

The South Community Assembly has been requested to nominate a Sheffield City Council appointee to the South West Area Board.

13. Recommendations

The South Community Assembly is recommended to:-

(1) have regard to any views expressed by the Cabinet Member for Homes and Neighbourhoods about the proposal to nominate Councillor Steve Jones to the Sheffield Homes South West Area Board, and having regard to any such views to nominate a member of the Assembly to this position;

(2) request the Director of Modern Governance to refer these nominations to full Council for approval at the earliest approval; and

(3) subject to Council approval, request the Assembly Manager to complete the necessary paperwork to effect these appointments, in consultation with the Director of Legal Services.
