What are Local Area Committees?



Connected to our communities and citizens Local Area Committees (LACs) are a way for you to get involved and make a difference your local community. Some budgets have already been devolved to the LACs to be used on issues and priorities that residents and communities have told us are important to them.



Collaborative

LACs are a chance for you to influence decision making, share your opinion and contribute to positive changes in your community. They are an opportunity for you to say what you would like to see improved in your areas. Each LAC has a £100k budget to develop and deliver priorities that have been outlined by the community in recent consultation. LACS will work with partners and stakeholders to link services and operate effectively in line with the needs of communities.

Who are the committee?

The Local Area Committee consists of twelve elected members representing the four wards included in the Central LAC. This includes:

- Councillor Josie Paszek (Vice Chair)

The LAC is supported by a small team of officers consisting of:


The Central Local Area Committee (LAC) is one of seven across the city and covers four electoral wards:

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Section 3: Central LAC Community Plan and Actions

The journey we took...

Online and Paper Citywide Survey
 Our survey ran from August to December
 2021. We received 924 responses for Central
 LAC from across all four wards.

2. Public Engagement Events / Roadshows Elected members and LAC officers held 9 face to face events across all four wards in local shopping centres, community centres and supermarkets.

3. Local Community Groups

We commissioned six voluntary, community and faith sector organisations to gather intelligence and connect with communities.

4. Leaders Walkabouts

Elected members and LAC officers held walkabouts with the Leader and Chief Executive of the Council to engage with local residents and groups and listen to their views.

5. Central LAC Public Meetings We hosted the first LAC public meeting at the Burton Street Foundation in September 2021 and held a second public meeting online in January 2022.

6. Young Sheffielders

We are working with local youth centres to ensure that we capture the voices of young residents and reach a wider variety of people through the LACs.

We will continue our engagement with local residents, groups, businesses and partners across the city to deliver the key priorities for the Central area

Central Budgets to deliver the plan :

To support the delivery of our Community Plan the Central LAC has a dedicated budget of £100,000 for 2022-23. The LAC is also able to influence a council budget of around £57,000 for targeted work around fly tipping and graffiti hotspots.

Where possible the Central LAC will be looking to work in partnership with local community groups to maximise funding opportunities.

Local ward councillors also oversee two local budgets: Ward Pots and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), which are separate pots of money available to fund different activities.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) (as of Dec 2021)	Broomhill & Sharrow Vale - £54, 761 .06 City - £148, 694.15 Hillsborough - £87, 117.58 Walkley - £111, 954.82	This funding is for supporting infrastructure projects as a result of development and has been accrued since 2015/16. There are a number of live projects in progress.

The Central LAC will regularly review and evaluate the plan, and the projects outlined.

Next Steps

The Central LAC will continue to listen to you and work to deliver the projects and priorities outlined in this plan; our commitments are:

- We will work with you to listen to your concerns and incorporate your thoughts and comments into the plan
- We will work with partners, including the VCFS (voluntary, community and faith sector) and local ٠ Page communities to deliver the priorities and projects outlined in our plan.
- We will continue to listen and connect with communities to understand their priorities
- ഗ We will hold a minimum of 4 public meetings a year to hear the views and concerns of local people and to provide updates on the Community Plan
- We will work to shape and influence council services as outlined in the plan to help us respond to . the needs of local people
- We will aim to represent the interest of local people and organisations with external organisations, as ٠ appropriate, to achieve the objectives outlined in the plan
- We will produce an annual report to update you on our progress
